About Today...

Today is the Feast of the Epiphany. An Epiphany is a sudden moment of understanding or revelation. In the Church, the Epiphany celebrates the visit of the Magi, recorded in Matthew's Gospel. It is significant as the moment at which Christ, the Jewish Messiah, is revealed also to the Gentiles (non-Jews). The Magi are rather mysterious characters. Matthew's account speaks simply of 'Magi from the east'. Most likely, the Magi were Persian Zoroastrians, whose priestly caste was called "magus" and were known for their study of the stars (Magi is the Latin plural of Magus). In the King James Bible, the word 'Magi' is translated simply as 'wise men'. It was a later tradition which fixed their number at three, made them kings and ascribed them with names — Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar.

In this perspective, the season of Epiphany is an apt one to pray for the worldwide mission of the Church. The feast of the Conversion of St Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, appropriately falls in the Epiphany season, as does the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

The season of joyful celebration that begins at Christmas now continues through the successive Sundays of Epiphany, and recalls the key events in which Jesus is recognised as God's son: his baptism; the wedding at Cana and finally his presentation in the Temple, 40 days after Christmas, when he was recognised by Simeon and Anna, in the celebration also known as Candlemas.
