About Today...

The Church is now in a season of remembrance which stretches from All Saints Day to the beginning of Advent. It is the last season of the Church's liturgical year, sometimes referred to as the "Kingdom Season", focusing on the coming Kingdom of God. It moves from remembering all the Saints who now inhabit that kingdom in all its fullness, towards the great feast of Christ the King, when we commemorate the kingship of Jesus in our own lives and look forward to the time when the whole creation will be ordered by his just and gentle rule.

Remembering our common story is about collectively recalling who we are, how we got here and what we're about. It is a deeply Biblical principle. When the Jewish people first arrived in the Promised Land, after slavery in Egypt, they vowed they would never forget what they had been through and how God had brought them to a far better place. At Passover, they Remember their story in order to change how they live in the future. Christians adopt the same principle at Holy Communion, as we Remember what Jesus did for us on the Cross, bringing us out of slavery to sin to freedom in God's kingdom. In both cases, we Remember the events as though we personally were there — passing through the Red Sea or standing at the foot of the Cross. We understand the cost and the value of the gift. It is our story: we were there and we live differently from now on as a result.

Today, we Remember the story of our conflicts. We remember how and why we chose one path over another, what it cost, and consider how we can build a better future. We remember how and why we belong together and reflect on how our actions (and inaction) impacts on others. But

above all we remember, with honour and gratitude, those who gave their today for our tomorrow.

Today's readings

Job 19.23-27a (Job, reflecting on his suffering, expresses an enduring hope) 'O that my words were written down!
O that they were inscribed in a book!
O that with an iron pen and with lead they were engraved on a rock for ever!
For I know that my Redeemer lives, and that at the last he will stand upon the earth; and after my skin has been thus destroyed, then in my flesh I shall see God, whom I shall see on my side, and my eyes shall behold, and not another. My heart faints within me!

Luke 20.27-38 (Jesus teaches about his coming kingdom)

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to Jesus ²⁸and asked him a question, 'Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. ²⁹Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; ³⁰then the second ³¹and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. ³²Finally the woman also died. ³³In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her.'

34 Jesus said to them, 'Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; ³⁵but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. ³⁶Indeed they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. ³⁷And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. ³⁸Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive.'
